

BEFTHOVEN CELEBRATING 250 YEARS OF BEETHOVEN

Ludwig van Beethoven is considered to be one of the greatest composers of all time. In 2020, his 250th birthday and his musical legacy will be celebrated across the world.



This is the international registered trademark for Beethoven's 250th birthday. The logo dates back to Beethoven himself, who used to sign some of his scores using his name without vowels: Bthvn.

Beethoven 250 will be a fantastic festival within Auckland Arts Festival featuring a full Beethoven symphony cycle and a myriad of exciting free and community events celebrating Beethoven's legacy and connecting him to our city and our people.

Right from the very first note of his very first symphony, Beethoven does something new. No symphony had ever started on such an unexpected chord. Yet here's the paradox: these first two symphonies fit quite happily within the classical mould Haydn and Mozart had created. Haydn, in particular, would have appreciated their quicksilver wit.

With the colossal Third though, the mould is shattered and cast aside. A symphony on such a gigantic scale was totally unprecedented. This is where Beethoven truly begins to reshape music.

After the 'Eroica', Beethoven returned to his Classical roots. Lithe and sophisticated, the ebullient Fourth Symphony is the ultimate Haydn tribute, and is Beethoven at his most outgoing and confident.

Then a complete change of mood. The extraordinarily original Fifth Symphony is a work of staggering power. It is unremittingly terse and intense; it begins in darkness and ends in blazing jubilation; it is one of the most famous pieces of music ever written, and with good reason. It doesn't matter how well you know Beethoven 5, a performance is always an event.



It's said that when Beethoven became deaf, the music he missed above all was birdsong. The *Pastoral* Symphony is a tender, affectionate picture of the countryside he loved so much, from a babbling brook to a violent thunderstorm. But it's not merely pictorial. In this very personal music, Beethoven pours out his joy at being in nature.

Joy in the Seventh Symphony is all about rhythm. 'The apotheosis of the dance', Wagner said, and he was right. This irresistible music skips and springs and leaps with vigour, yet also with miraculous lightness and grace.

Beethoven's whimsical, amiable Eighth Symphony is the work of a great artist who also happens to be a fellow human, laughing and joking like the rest of us.

Our shared symphonic journey ends with a mighty hymn to our universal humanity, the heaven-storming Ninth. The orchestra alone wasn't enough for Beethoven's ecstatic vision: voices were necessary. 'All men shall become brothers,' they sing. 'I embrace you, O you millions – this kiss is for all the world!' With this music, with its vast, elemental force, Beethoven speaks to us across the centuries and into infinity.

Giordano Bellincampi opens the New Zealand Herald Premier Series with a sparkle of trumpets in Bach's cheerful Suite, which includes the famous 'Air on the G string'.

Then a major event, a new work by the distinguished Danish composer Hans Abrahamsen, co-commissioned by the APO with the Berlin Philharmonic and played by that orchestra's Principal Horn, Stefan Dohr.

To finish, Brahms' happiest symphony. Composing his first symphony had been a huge struggle, but when Brahms set to writing the Second he found the music flowed easily onto the manuscript. It's a song of the high hills in high summer.

It separates music for two quite different cities. Jennifer Higdon's tribute to her home town, Atlanta, celebrates the 'lush carpet' of its parks and gardens, fed by 'streams, creeks and rivers'. The American conductor Robert Spano gave its premiere.

Vaughan Williams, despite *The Lark Ascending*, saw himself as a Londoner. His portrait of the Edwardian metropolis at the height of its power is no mere postcard, but a subtle portrait of the city he loved.

Shostakovich wrote his gleefully crazy concerto at 26. It's uproarious music from a high-spirited young man. Strauss was even younger when he composed a tone-poem set at an artist's deathbed. We hear the high ideals the artist sought all his life, and at the last hour, the radiant transformation of his soul.

Rodrigo's elegant concerto was inspired by the royal gardens in the city of Aranjuez, and it summons up the dignified, courtly past of the Kings of Spain.

Ravel summons up different imperial eras, in his evocations of Vienna in three-four time – Schubert's, in the *Valses nobles et sentimentales*, and Johann Strauss's in *La Valse*.

The king in Stravinsky's dazzling fairy-tale ballet is, in fact, an ogre. He dances an *Infernal Dance* which can't be said to be especially courtly or dignified, because it is absolutely electrifying.

Ask any violinist for their favourite concerto and there's a good chance you'll be told Mendelssohn. It's one of those pieces in which musicians can always find new depths, no matter how familiar it is.

The same is true of Sibelius's lifeaffirming Second Symphony, warm and expansive music which ends in exultation.

Dame Gillian Whitehead has said Resurgences is about 'living away from the sea and being drawn back to ideas of the sea, ideas that are very strong with all New Zealanders – looking out to distant horizons'.

Spacious yet taut, passionate yet terrifying, open-hearted yet bleak: Mahler's titanic Sixth Symphony is a whole world. It begins with an implacable drumbeat for the entire orchestra and it ends with brutal blows of fate, 'the last of which fells the hero as a tree is felled', to quote its composer.



The much-loved NZ pianist Michael Houstoun is, in his words, 'folding up the tent' in December 2020. It's bittersweet news, but there could be no more fitting way for Giordano Bellincampi and the APO to farewell him than with 'the Rach 3', a mighty concerto for a mighty musician.

The Fairytale Poem by Russian composer Sofia Gubaidulina veers from folk-inspired music into unexpectedly jazzy places.

Nielsen's energetic, soaring symphony finishes the programme. 'One word to indicate what Music alone is capable of expressing to the full,' said the composer. 'Music is Life, and like it, inextinguishable.' Michael would agree.

Chinese-born and Parisian-trained, Qigang Chen's music blends East and West in a manner to set the ears tingling. His gossamer homage to Peking opera is a modern perspective on this venerable Chinese music.

Janáček's retelling of the story of the Cossack warrior Taras Bulba is startlingly bloodthirsty, and enormously exciting.

Dvořák's evergreen Cello Concerto comes from his years in America. Longing for his homeland, he poured his soul into the piece. The marvellous Chinese-Australian cellist Li-Wei Qin will give a glowing performance.

Written in 1944, Bernstein's *On the Town* follows three sailors on 24 hours' leave in New York. This suite from the show captures its irrepressible exuberance, and also the poignancy of young people in those dramatic, uncertain times.

The prodigiously talented Australian violinist Grace Clifford plays one of the loveliest works for the violin, the lyrical, autumnal concerto by Bernstein's compatriot Samuel Barber.

The Symphonic Dances was Rachmaninov's last work. Darkly glittering, exhilarating, and above all permeated with the very soul of Russia, it's a summation of his life and music.

Bruckner never finished his Ninth Symphony, leaving a colossal three-movement torso. Several people have attempted to finish it but this is really rather unnecessary. Even if it is unavoidably an unconventional structure, this vast edifice is magnificently complete in its own right. The slow movement with which it ends is Bruckner's glimpse of God and eternity.

To open, one of Mozart's finest piano concertos. Only Mozart could write music of such profound depth under such a supremely graceful surface.

In another example of the APO's growing international reputation, the Canadian composer Gary Kulesha has written a new concerto for our Principal Oboe, Bede Hanley.

Debussy's little masterpiece is languid, ecstatic music of a hot summer afternoon lying in the grass. It's also quietly revolutionary. Modern music began here.

Prokofiev's last symphony is direct and tuneful, in the best Russian tradition, but there's more to it than that. It was written by a sick man, in dark straits, and below the nostalgic surface is a yearning for his lost happiness.

Tchaikovsky's Fourth Symphony opens with a stark fanfare which, Tchaikovsky said, represented 'Fate, that ominous power', adding 'There is no alternative but to submit to Fate'. His friend and patron, Mme von Meck, heard 'profound, terrifying despair' in this music. True, but it has also passion, drama and ultimately catharsis.

The superb pianist Ingrid Fliter returns with Schumann's ineffably poetic concerto, and to open the concert, a new work from the multifaceted Auckland composer, and former APO composer-inresidence, Leonie Holmes.

The APO concert season blasts off with seven minutes of simple, uncomplicated fun, courtesy of Shostakovich's helter-skelter overture.

Then, perhaps the archetypal Romantic piano concerto. It's one of the summits for concert pianists, and to conquer it the soloist needs heroic strength yet also delicacy and refinement.

Mussorgsky originally wrote his musical tour of an art gallery for the piano, and never considered orchestrating it. It was that musical magician, Ravel, who refashioned *Pictures* into a fabulous showpiece for an orchestra with plenty of panache.

'Once upon a time there was a prep-school boy', wrote Britten. 'There was one curious thing: he wrote music, reams of it'. The former prep-school boy recycled some of his best juvenilia into this captivating piece.

Handel's splendid *Fireworks Music* was composed for a grand celebration, marred only by stray pyrotechnics burning down some buildings. The APO's pyrotechnics will be solely musical.

Fauré saw death as 'an aspiration towards the happiness of the hereafter'; his bright, serene Requiem entirely omits Judgment Day. The great British choral conductor Stephen Layton returns to the APO with Fauré's intimate, rarely heard original version.

'I was never so devout as during the time I was working on *The Creation*,' wrote Haydn. The Genesis story gave him a matchless opportunity to depict the glories of nature – the animals and birds, the woodlands, the sea, the stars – and, in music of astonishing originality, the chaos before God created the world.

The Creation was suggested by Handel's oratorios, but its music is quite different to Handelian grandiosity. It encapsulates Haydn at his best: genial, witty, wise, always open to awe and wonder and to an uncomplicated enjoyment of life.

His imagination fired by the tale of Juliet and her Romeo, Prokofiev composed shimmering, weightless music for the lovers, virtuosic music for the fighting, transcendent music at the silent tomb, and unforgettable music for the audience.

At once monumental and intimate, Brahms' concerto needs a violinist of Olympian stamina who can also play what's essentially chamber music with the orchestra, and Benjamin Beilman is such a musician.

Mendelssohn adored Shakespeare, and wrote an overture to *A Midsummer Night's Dream* when he was, amazingly, just 17. Years later he added some incidental music, which distils the essence of this most featherweight of comedies.

Between these two, perhaps Mozart's most tempestuous symphony, memorably used in the opening of *Amadeus*.

Peter Grimes is a gripping theatrical experience and an overpowering musical one. It will be a highlight of the year don't miss it.





Sistema Aotearoa is a youth development programme that uses orchestral music making to improve educational and social outcomes for tamariki, their whānau and the vibrant South Auckland community.

Based in Ōtara, the programme provides young people with inspirational opportunities, and in 2020 over 1200 students between the ages of 2 and 16 will take part in diverse activities including lively early childhood music sessions, in-school musicianship lessons, instrumental tuition and concert performances.

Sistema Aotearoa is a fully inclusive programme that is free for all tamariki, creating life changing orchestral music making and developing important social skills such as leadership, resilience and confidence.

Over 350 families are involved with the Pūoru Tuakana core programme, allowing the joy of

music-making to become an exciting part of their whānau, and generating pride within the community.

Sistema Aotearoa directly reflects the community we work with, and 97 percent of our children are Pasifika or Māori. We incorporate Māori and Pasifika music into our repertoire, blending music that represents the identity of our community with traditional orchestral repertoire.

Sistema Aotearoa is an independent charitable trust. It has its own governance and while it enjoys a close partnership with the Auckland Philharmonia Orchestra, the trust receives no financial support from the APO.
