CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Reflecting on 2023 brings to mind memorable musical experiences, organisational successes, and landmark transitions.

Following a pivotal 17 years at the helm, in August we honoured former Chief Executive Barbara Glaser by inducting her as a patron of the orchestra. Barb joins fellow patrons Dame Rosanne Meo, Dame Jenny Gibbs, and Dame Kiri Te Kanawa as an honouree of the highest order for the Auckland Philharmonia. Her impact on the organisation can be felt in the quality of the orchestra, the inspiring musical leadership of our Music Director, and our strong relationships with funders and audiences across the city.

At the end of 2023 we welcomed Diana Weir as our new Chief Executive. I am grateful to the CEO Search Committee who worked tirelessly to ensure that our rigorous international search resulted in a strong successor. We are all thrilled at Diana's appointment and excited for all she will accomplish in this role, alongside Music Director Giordano Bellincampi.

Our staff and musicians have maintained their remarkable resilience this year as we continue to seek a more permanent home to replace our damaged and unusable Phil Hall property on Dominion Road. This enormous project to find a new space continues to be a priority for the organisation and is guided by the Phil Hall Project Working Group, whose contribution to this important challenge continues to be immensely appreciated.

I am grateful to my colleagues on the Board of Directors, who volunteer their time and resources to ensure the governance and institutional success of Auckland's orchestra. We thank former board member Elizabeth Kerr who stepped down in 2023, and also welcomed new board member Lizzie Marvelly. I would like to also acknowledge the Board of the Auckland Philharmonia Foundation for their continued dedication to ensuring the ongoing stability of the orchestra.

We thank our government supporters at Creative New Zealand and Auckland

Council, whose annual grant through the Auckland Regional Amenities Funding Act (ARAFA) ensures critical operating support, and to our family of donors and funders, who believe in the impact a metropolitan orchestra has for a city.

Our 100+ employees contribute to the cultural, economic and social engine of our city. Led by our inspiring Music Director Giordano Bellincampi, we are lucky to have such phenomenal artists and musicians serving our communities. We thank our musicians for continuing to offer inspirational and enriching experiences for Aucklanders from across the region.

Thank you for all for believing in this work, and the power of orchestral music to inspire and connect Aucklanders. Congratulations on a wonderful 2023, and here's to the future.

CHIEF **EXECUTIVE'S** REPORT

In my short time as Chief Executive of the Auckland Philharmonia, it has become abundantly evident to me why Aucklanders are so proud of this city. With our miles of coastline and glorious (but sometimes mercurial) weather, our vibrant cultural sector and green spaces, our active sports scene and sailing culture - Auckland is a special place.

It is only fitting that New Zealand's largest and most cosmopolitan city should have an equally impressive international-calibre orchestra to both serve and reflect the diversity of its people. Our staff and musicians are proud to represent our city, offering enriching, engaging and energising musical experiences for people from across Tāmaki Makaurau.

The 2023 season saw our musicians reach over 203K people with 64 selfpresented, live performances and a further 31 collaborations with creative partners such as Royal New Zealand Ballet, New Zealand Opera, the Michael Hill International Violin Competition and Duco Events (Synthony). In our mainstage series, our artistic highlights included the Australasian premiere of Korngold's Die tote Stadt, Mahler's Fifth Symphony alongside musicians of the Australian National Academy of Music, a partnership with Auckland Live to present the music of Sondheim, our annual Matariki concert with Troy Kingi, and a new commission for taonga puoro and orchestra by New Zealand composers Salina Fisher and Jerome Kavanagh.

Through our Learn & Participate programme (formerly APO Connecting) we engaged with over 30,000 people through performances and participation activities. Our musicians performed across the community, in Takapuna, Remuera, Titirangi, St. Heliers and Howick, for our In Your Neighbourhood and Up Close series. They also introduced young children and families to the sights and sounds of the orchestra through APO 4 Kids, and continued the amazing work in schools across the city.

We introduced a new brand identity, reflective of our progressive values and

the beautiful skyline colours of Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland. And we welcomed internationally acclaimed artists into Auckland Town Hall, contributing to development of Auckland as a key destination on the world stage. Performances featuring works by New Zealand composers Salina Fisher, Gareth Farr, Ross Harris and Leonie Holmes, to name a few, were indicative of our dedication to supporting New Zealand's cultural identity in our programming mix.

This season we celebrated the appointment of six new musicians, Gabrielle Pho (Principal Horn), Dominic Jacquemard (Sub Principal Percussion and Assistant Timpani), Ashley Brown (Section Principal Cello), Begonia Chan (cello), Martin Roberts (cello) and Christine Lee (violin) and recognised the retirement of two musicians Martin Lee (Principal Cor Anglais) and Matthias Erdich (double bass).

Auckland deserves an orchestra worthy of its global status, its diversity, and its vibrancy.

It takes a village to raise an orchestra our vast array of stakeholders including donors, foundations, government funders, subscribers, and fans inspire and enable us to continue to reach Aucklanders with the joy of orchestral music. Led by Music Director Giordano Bellincampi, our core of musicians, supported by a dedicated and nimble team of administrators, rehearse and perform week after week to thousands of guests.







ARTISTIC & PERFORMANCE HIGHLIGHTS

The Auckland Philharmonia's first fully intact season following the lifting of pandemic restrictions was one that saw the realisation of many rescheduled concerts featuring programmes and artists whose scheduled appearances had been scuppered in previous seasons. This included the culmination of the Beethoven symphony cycle in two sold-out concerts of Symphonies Nos.8 and 9, the latter featuring a highly impressive Auckland Phil debut from Kiwi opera singer Manase Latu, who shone in the tenor solos. Another successfullu completed reschedule featured another significant debut: the New Zealand debut of celebrated Auckland-born violinist Geneva Lewis, whose recent career highlights include a 2022 Borletti-Buitoni Trust Award, a 2021 Avery Fisher Career Grant, being featured as Musical America's New Artist of the Month, and most recently, being named one of BBC Radio 3's New Generation Artists. Lastly, the Australian National Academy of Music (ANAM) joined the orchestra in a tour de force performance of Mahler's epic Fifth Symphony, paired with Wagner orchestral selections.

2023 included a major composer anniversary; we celebrated Sergei Rachmaninov's 150th birthday with performances of his Second Piano Concerto, Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini, Isle of the Dead and Symphonic Dances. A further composer whose works featured prominently in the season was another naturalised American, Hollywood film score legend Erich Wolfgang Korngold. The orchestra first explored some of Korngold's purely orchestral music, Overture to a Drama, Dance in the Old Style, and the Sea Hawk: Suite, before giving the cinematic master's rarely performed operatic masterpiece Die tote Stadt (1919) its long-overdue New Zealand première. Giordano Bellincampi assembled a top-drawer international and Kiwi cast, and the action of the story was compellingly conveyed in Frances Moore's inventive staging. However, the ultimate stars of the evening were the Auckland Phil musicians, who tackled this Everest of operatic scores with absolute commitment.

The year was also a banner one for

international talent making regional debuts. The Auckland Phil hosted Australasian debuts of five artists (Geneva Lewis, Jaemin Han, Lise de la Salle, Annelien Van Wauwe, and Chloé van Soeterstède), the New Zealand debuts of a further eight artists (Inon Barnatan, Elena Schwarz, Camilla Hoitenga, Benjamin Beilman, Aleš Briscein, Manuela Uhl,

Aleš Briscein, Manuela Uhl, Eivind Aadland, and Sergey Khachatryan).

Of the five world premieres of New Zealand music given during the season, the most substantial and meaningful work was one merging the sound worlds of orchestral music and traditional taonga puoro. The Auckland Phil commission of Salina Fisher and Jerome Kavanagh's collaboratively composed Papatūānuku was led by Kiwi conductor Vincent Hardaker and featured Kavanagh performing an



array of taonga puoro. This major New Zealand work's first performance took place in the context of a programme celebrating harmony with nature and spiritual interconnectedness. Other landmark moments included the Australasian premiere of Kaija Saariaho's Aile du Songe, just two weeks after the composer's untimely passing, and the New Zealand premiere of Toshio Hosokawa's Circulating Ocean.

The (mostly) conductorless chamber orchestra series Baroque & Beyond continued at Holy Trinity Cathedral for a second year. This series gave several Auckland Phil musicians the chance to shine as soloists. The first programme highlighted the artistry of Principal Oboe Bede Hanley and Associate Concertmaster Liu-Yi Retallick in collaboration with violinist Benjamin Morrison, the only Kiwi member of the Vienna Philharmonic. The second was an epic play-direct for Concertmaster Andrew Beer, who played eight concerti in total over the course of an evening, a juxtaposition of Vivaldi's and Piazzolla's Four Seasons.

Behind the scenes, the Auckland Phil's Artistic team marked the end of an era, bidding farewell to one of our longestserving and most beloved members, Artistic Coordinator Debbie Nicholson, who retired after over 20 years in the role. Bijoux Nortje has now joined the team and is off to a great start in filling these important shoes.

EDUCATION AND OUTREACH

We at the Auckland Philharmonia firmly believe in the transformative potential of music.

Our Auckland Philharmonia Learn & Participate programme (formerly Connecting) is dedicated to fostering, cultivating, and revitalising a deep passion for orchestral music within the diverse communities of Tāmaki Makaurau.

CONNECTING WITH SCHOOLS

DISCOVERY FEEDBACK FROM STUDENT

In 2023, Auckland Philharmonia Learn & Participate (L&P) maintained its Auckland Philharmonia Partnership Schools programme, delivering 36 performances and providing 516 hours of mentoring across 60 memberships, alongside engagements with the Auckland Youth Orchestra, Tironui Muisc Trust and Sistema Aotearoa.

Our annual Discovery concert for secondary schools attracted 1,132 attendees and we were delighted to present *Kia Mau Ki Tō Ūkaipō* by Six60 in partnership with Te Kura Māori o Ngā Tapuwae as the concert finale.

The Kiwi Kapers concert, tailored for primary and intermediate schools, attracted a combined audience of 3,265 across four concerts in November. This included a collaboration with Trick of the Light Theatre Company, presenting *The Bookbinder* with original music by Tane Upjohn-Beatson.

Additionally, our collaboration with Carnegie Hall continued through the Link Up programme, where nine schools presented a joint concert with the Auckland Philharmonia in August at Due Drop Events Centre in South Auckland.



CONNECTING WITH ASPIRING MUSICIANS

HE TŪHONO KI ĀKONGA WAIATA

Our work with Aspiring Musicians takes many forms. Our two major workstreams include the Inspire Partnership with the University of Auckland and the Haydn Staples Piano Scholarship. These programmes are highly curated pre-professional activations that finesse the next generation of musicians here in Auckland. The Auckland Philharmonia invested over 290 hours of delivery, including mentoring, masterclasses and performance opportunities in these programmes in 2023.

At our Big Play in, 43 aspiring orchestral musicians between the ages of 13-25 played alongside their Auckland Philharmonia counterparts in a side-by-side event at the Auckland Town Hall. The programme included Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto No.1 and *The Nutcracker*: Suite No.1.

I was able to play alongside professional musicians — it was a truly unique and helpful experience.

BIG PLAY IN ORCHESTRA PARTICIPANT

This was the first time I've had a large ensemble perform my work, so I was just on cloud nine the entire day. Hearing everyone else's pieces was amazing as well and showed a diversity of writing style that I hadn't heard from my classmates previously, as performance opportunities from my cohort's work is so rare. I'd say my biggest takeaway is to never stop writing for live players. The amount of magic that came from that session is incalculable and I never want to stop trying to recreate and enjoy that experience.

Over 800 Aucklanders took part in our specialised and bespoke Community programmes in 2023. This included a special workshop for amputees in partnership with Peke Waihanga Artificial Limb Centre. The Auckland Philharmonia's Community Play-In brings musicians of all ages and skill levels together to collaborate at Auckland Town Hall. This year, over 350 participants performed selected French works, including musicians from across the North Island and children from Sistema Whangarei and Sistema Aotearoa.

We also hosted three free concerts for families in our Community Classics: Song & Dance series, featuring recognisable pieces and performances by New Zealand artists, including Antonia Brightwell and Eden Vaastra from the University of Auckland performing the Lakmé 'Flower Duet' ('Sous le dôme épais'). Over 1,700 people from across Auckland attended these concerts.

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


















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
